Item No. 1: Letter dated 27 Sep 1885 from Lucas Brodhead, Spring Station, Kentucky, to R. A. Brock, Richmond, Virginia.

Dear Sir:

Your favor 21st inst received and noted. Very many thanks for the memo sent - I am of the opinion that the Upshurs and Upshaws were different families, but not sure. John Upshaw of Essex Co. was born July 21st 1715 - I think he was born in England, at any rate my aunt thinks that he was brought to this country by his father & mother with two other brothers. My idea is that the Upshaws came from England early in the 18th century. I can find no mention of them earlier than 1731 - the Hannah Upshaw you mention must have been the mother of John Upshaw as he had a daughter Hannah, my grandmother.

John Upshaw married Mary Crittendon whose mother, I think, was a Reynolds related to the Sthreshleys, Ritchies, & c. Thanking you again for your kindness.

You may remember my calling at your residence some years ago. and your showing me a copy of the Westmoreland Resolutions, of which my wire's ancestor, James Upshaw, was a signer & she is about to join the Color dames, and wishes to furnish proof (of) her descent & will you please let me know the sources of your information for the note about the Upshaws on page 372, Vol 10 of Va. Hist. Coll., gotten out by you; also on page 153 of Vol 6. Also the address of Dr. Hugh Blair Grigsby,

collaborator of Vols. 9 & 10.

Item No. 2: Letter dated 30 Nov 1898 from F. P. Glass, Secy. of the Montgomery Advertiser, Montgomery, Alabama, to Mr. R. A. Brock.

Dr. Sir:

My wife (has) been invited to join the Colonial Dames and wishes to do so through a Virginia line. The enclosed copy of her grandmother's lineage shows her various lines on that side. I want to perfect her line for eligibility, and wish to know your charge for doing the same.

I have been trying to perfect it on the Upshaw line, but have not succeeded. A John Upshaw was a Burgess before the Revolution, but he was a brother of her ancestor, it seems, though I am not certain. James Upshaw ought to be eligible, because of his activity in the Westmoreland Resolutions, but it is not clear that he is from the by-laws of the Dames, with which you are doubtless familiar.

Please look into the matter, and let me know if you think you can perfect the chain from any of her lines, and if so, the cost.

Her grandfather was Judge William Byrd, who was of Va. extraction, but I have not been able to locate his connection with the Westover Byrds, though he said he was connected with them. His father was Wm. Fulton Byrd of South Carolina, and his grandfather George Byrd of Virginia. Judge Byrd's mother was an Easeley of a prominent Virginia family. Her father was Daniel Weldon Easeley, related to the Weldons of Va.

Your early attention will oblige.

Massie / Upshaw

I, Maria Massie Byrd, declare that I am at this date in my 81st year. My parents were William Anderson Massie (1) and Sarah Upshaw (2), both born and reared in Virginia.

My paternal grandparents were John Massie (3) and Judith Moss (4). My maternal grandparents were James Upshaw (5) and Mary Martin (6).

My paternal great-grandparents were John Massie (7) and Agnes Nelson Anderson (8).

My maternal great-grandparents were James Upshaw (9) and Reynolds (10).

William A. Massie (1) had sisters:

- 2. Lucie " John Estell
- 3. Agnes " Preston Yeatman(?)

John Massie (3) had no brothers and his sisters were Mrs. Ould, and Sallie, who never married. He was only 16 at the time of the Revolution, but was a soldier.

Judith Moss (4) had brothers, Samuel and Reuben, and a sister, Mrs. Lockhart.

James Upshaw (5) had brother Jere, and sisters, Mrs. Betsie Anderson and Mrs. Patsie Buckner. Last moved to Kentucky.

Mary Martin's (6) parents were Arthur ? (sic) Martin and Marie Latonde. She had a half-brother, William Martin.

John Reynolds of England was great uncle of my mother. He never lived in Virginia, because his wife, Lady Reynolds, would not leave England. He visited Virginia frequently, carrying on a shipping trade. At the time of his death two of his vessels were at Norfolk. They went back to England and were taken possession of by his wife. He had 10,000 acres of land in Greenbrier County. Va., and other property which passed to Va. relations.

Dr. Sir:

Your 3rd is at hard. Enclosed is \$10.00 as your retaining fee.

I enclose a lot of Anderson notes, inasmuch as you say so many of that name were Burgesses. The notes previously sent you show Mrs. Glass's connection with Agnes Nelson Anderson Massie,

The Massie's came from New Kent Co. for the most part; the Upshaws from Essex: the Andersons from Hanover.

The tradition is that John Massie's father was William.

I also enclose all I know of the Easley and Weldon connections.

Please try to push the investigation, as Mrs. Glass's invitation to join the Colonial Dames is good for only a limited period. The State meeting is to February next, and the State Regent desires all papers to be ready by Jan'y 1st.

Item No. 5: Letter dated 12 Dec 1898 from F. P. Glass, Secy. of the Montgomory Advertiser, Montgomery, Alabama, to Mr. R. A. Brock.

Dr. Sir:

Yours 9th is at hand & I wrote you Saturday, remitting \$10.00 and enclosing all the data at my command as to the Andersons, Massies, and Weldons. Our letters crossed; doubtless you have mine today, just (as) I have yours.

Hoping you may be able to work out the matter. I am yours truly.

Item No. 6: Letter dated 17 Dec 1898 from F. P. Glass, Secy. of the Montgomery Advertiser, Montgomery, Alabama, to Mr. R. A. Brock.

Dr. Sir:

Yours of the 14th at hand. I think it very probable that you are right about William Massie being Mrs. G's (sic) ancestor, because I find this in a letter from her cousin, or rather her grandmother's cousin, Mrs. Lucy Orr of Nashville, written on June 12, 198:

"I believe my great-grandfather's name was <u>William</u>; that my uncle, Mrs. Byrd's father (Mrs. G's great-grandfather) had his grandfather's name, and his mother's maiden name - William Anderson Massie; if so, he must have been the William Massie who was a member of the house of Burgesses."

This William A. Massie was a surgeon in the War of 1812, having graduated at Paris. His people were evidently wealthy to have sent abroad in that day.

I hope you may be able to confirm this connection, and let me have it in shape for Mrs. Glass's use before Jan'y 1st, when she desires to send in her papers.

Azariah Martin, mentioned in Amherst County, Virginia, in the Revolution, by Mrs. Sweeny, moved to Madison County, Kentucky, with several other Revolutionary soldiers, where his widow, Lucy (Roades) applied for a pension in 1840.

I suspect these Martin families of Amherst County may have some connection with the Upshaw family from the mother of William Upshaw, Cordelia Upshaw Martin, whom William Upshaw names in his will in 1720.



Virginia Historical Genealogies, by Boddie; date and page no. unknown. Contributed by Mrs. Charlotte D. Parrott, who comments: "The two young Upshaw boys, Arthur and Able, came from England with William Stone when they were said to be 14 or 15 years of age. They supposedly left home because they did not like their step-mother; adventure had something to do with it also. Could these young Upshaw boys have been related to William Stone somehow, perhaps through their mother?"

Governor William Stone born in England about 1603, in Accomac granted land for 34 servants; came before 1633. He was Justice that year, also Sheriff of Northampton. He was a Protestant.

He came to Maryland from Northampton County, Virginia; Stone pedigree recorded in Heralds of London, 1634. Stone married Verlinda Graves, daughter of Capt. Thomas Graves, Burgess for Smyth's Hundreds in the General Assembly of Virginia, 1619. When Leonard Calvert of Maryland died, Lord Baltimore appointed Capt. William Stone in his place.
